



Defining Virtual and Remote Learning



The determining factor of rather or not children will return to the brick & m o r t a r schools and

be face-to-face with their teachers or be at home learning from sessions offered through the school lies in the status of our current Health Protection Condition (HPCON) level.

If the HPCON status is at Bravo (B), the schools will have in person teaching. This allows the children to physically go to their designated brick & mortar schools and be face-to-face with their teachers. However, certain health measures will need to be followed by students, teachers, and parents. If the HPCON status is at Charlie (C), all schools will operate using remote or virtual learning.

Even though this may be a hard pill to swallow, you may be able to rest assured knowing that there is a difference between virtual learning and remote learning.

Remote learning is the learning style DoDEA transitioned into in the Spring when we first went to HPCON C.. Remote learning means that your child(ren) are or have been attending a traditional brick & mortar building for school but because of the current health situation, school continues in a remote location. Neither the students, educators are physically present in the traditional

classroom environment so, technology is used to relay information such as discussion boards, video conferencing, and online assessments. This remote location has been the home setting. Remote learning provides an opportunity for students and teachers to remain connected and engaged with the content even though they may not be face-to-face. If HPCON status changes from Charlie to Bravo, all students can return back to brick & mortar school. For more information on remote learning, please visit

Virtual learning is an online-based platform that offers students and educators digital solutions that enhance the learning experience. Virtual learning can be likened to the infamous distance learning style. virtual learning, students will receive digital communication throughout their studies. Virtual learning with DoDEA will allow your child to take no more than five (5) classes per semester for high school students and five (5) classes: mathematics, language arts, social studies, science and one elective (music, art, or physical education) for K-8. If HPCON status changes from Charlie to Bravo, all students enrolled in virtual learning must stay in virtual learning until they have completes an entire semester. After the semester has been achieved, parents can request to go back to in person learning. For more information on virtual learning, please visit

- DoDEA plans to fully reopen schools for SY 2020/21 if local HPCON levels allow.
- Students will attend school full-time with regular instruction from teachers.
- DoDEA's comprehensive safety requirement will align with CDC and DoD guidance to ensure that employees and students are protected to the greatest extent possible.

- If local conditions prevent in-person classes, students will engage in remote learning with their classroom teachers.



- · Available to all DoDEA students.
- DoDEA Virtual School (DVS) enrolls virtual students in 5 core classes to be taught by existing DoDEA teachers.
- Families will be asked to commit to at least the 1st semester online.
- Another enrollment period will occur in the fall for a 2nd semester of full-time DVS or in-person instruction in schools.
- High school students in the virtual school option will need to verify they are on track to graduate given the limited number of courses they will take each semester.

Contingency Planning

In the event that schools cannot fully reopen due to local health conditions, or if the virus drives additional interruptions in school operations, as a contingency brick and mortar students will move to the remote environment and receive digital education from their classroom teachers.

The Order of the Bushido

On 31 July 2020, Ms. Baxter-Oakley was presented The Order of the Bushido award. In Japanese, Bushido is translated to mean the way of the warriors. The word Bushido was first used in Japan during the 17th century but did not come into common usage until after 1899. Bushido was a set of codes of honor and ideals that dictated the samurai way of life that was uttered and unwritten and adapted to military life. There are eight values of Bushido – righteousness, courage, benevolence, respect, sincerity, honor, loyalty, and self control. These values run parallel with the Army Values of loyalty, duty, respect, selfless service, honor, integrity, and personal courage.

Ms. Baxter-Oakley has served on Camp Zama's elite team of warriors carrying out the codes of honor in a most distinguished manner as the Arnn knight principal. After serving as a knight for over six years, it is no surprise that she carried the samurai traits all along. Camp Zama wishes her all the best as she embarks on a new adventure in Guam.





SET UP YOUR SCHOOL LUNCH ACCOUNT

REGISTER EACH STUDENT

- » Obtain 10-digit DoDEA student ID# for all children from the school registrar.
- » You will need each student's ID# for step 2.



SET UP LUNCH ACCOUNT WITH EXCHANGE

- » Visit your local Exchange Customer Service to set up an account for each student.
- » A 6-digit pin number will be assigned for your child to use to deduct the cost of meals, a la carte items & drinks.
- » All students, even those eligible for free & reduced price meals & Sure Start need a lunch account.



DEPOSIT MONEY INTO STUDENT ACCOUNTS

- » To deposit money to your child's meal account online, set up an account on MYPAYMENTSPLUS. MPP charges a 4.75%management fee for all deposits made online or on its mobile app.
- » Deposits made at your Exchange or school cafeteria are FREE.
- » New students:
 - » Visit www.mypaymentsplus.com. Follow onscreen directions and register your student(s) using their student ID#. You can have multiple students on one account.
- » Returning & new students:
 - » Deposit into the School Meal Program account for school meals.
 - » Deposit into the general account for a la carte items & drinks.
- » With MPP you can: View cafeteria balances, view purchases, set up low balance account alerts & make payments.



Back to School: Special Needs & Social Distancing

School children with special needs faced unusual disruption to the end of their school year in May/June 2020; and, teachers, parents, and caregivers scrambled to turn the living room into a classroom. School closures and social distancing did not just cause impromptu homeschooling, it also has the effect of causing a longer at-home summer and the need to prepare for a new normal in the upcoming school year. Parents, caregivers, and teachers are now required to address such questions as: (1) How did my role as a member of my child with special needs team change?; (2) What does his or her IEP look like?; (3) What shape will services take in the upcoming school year?; (4) How do I continue to advocate for my child given the new circumstances?



What Homeschooling Laws Do Students OCONUS Follow?



Being OCONUS is one thing, but being OCONUS and deciding to home school may have parents feeling as if they are alone. This is not the case!

Homeschool is legal in all 50 states and each state has their own unique homeschool laws. To make it easy for parents the HSLDA website offers a user-friendly map. (www.hslda.org)

Being stationed OCONUS comes with certain benefits for those who are homeschooled. There are no specific state laws that have to be followed when you are OCONUS. However, this

does not give parents hall passes to disregard quality education at home. It is suggested that parents look at the state requirements for where they think they will be PCSing in the future to make sure the program they are using will meet that state's requirements. Another resource to use is the state's Department of Education website as well.

Parents should select a homeschool program that is accredited by one of the 6 national accrediting bodies. These accrediting bodies are as follows;

Accrediting Bureau of Health Education Schools (ABHES) (recognized by USDE), Accrediting Commission of Career **Schools and Colleges** (ACCSC) (recognized by **USDE), Accrediting Council** for Continuing Education and Training (ACCET) (recognized by USDE), Accrediting Council for Independent Colleges and Schools (ACICS) (recognized by USDE), Distance Education **Accrediting Commission** (DEAC) (recognized by USDE and CHEA), and Council on Occupational Education (COE) (recognized by USDE).
