



Child & School Report Cards

October 22, 2020 marks the end of the first quarter. That means that report cards are not too far away. Parents may be wondering if a report card is necessary or rather or not they should be concerned with the grades reported on their child's report card.

The report card serves as a means of communication intended to inform a parent about their child's academic progress or digress during the school year. Because many parents feel the report card is the most important document they receive during the school year, the educators at Arnn Elementary and Zama Middle High School take pride in accurately reflecting their student's performance. Report card content tend to affect how parents form their opinion of the school's concern for their child. DoDEA parents are fortunate enough to have Grade Speed to track their child's progress along the way. Parents of students receiving D's or F's should be aware of progress prior to receiving the report card. Parent/Teacher conferences for Arnn Elementary are scheduled for October 29-30, 2020. During Parent/ Teacher conferences, parents are urged to address any concerns they may have with their child's grades.

Just like an individual student receives a report card, DoDEA schools receive an overall report card as well. DoDEA's School Report Cards (SRCs) are very similar to those required by the No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Act. The SRCs list school contact information, school improvement goals, a school's student demographic profile, and academic indicators such as the SAT and TerraNova scores. The SRCs were created as a part of DoDEA's response to greater accountability to parents and stakeholders. They are designed to help families who may be transitioning to DoDEA schools by giving them an overview of a new school before their child ever sets foot in the classroom. The SRCs also contain valuable information that will be of use to representatives at the headquarters, area, and district levels so that they can become familiar with the schools that they will be visiting.

REPORT CARDS DO NOT INDICATE HOW SUCCESSFUL YOUR CHILD WILL BE AT THAT SCHOOL



A school report card is a tool for promoting state, local education agencies and school accountability. It is also a tool for engaging parents and communities in meaningful discussions about the academic challenges and opportunities facing a school.

DATA REQUIRED ON REPORT CARDS



STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

- State assessment scores
- Testing participation rates
- Percentage of students at each achievement level

READING THE REPORT CARD

When looking at Student Achievement LOOK FOR:

Words such as "Met / Not Met" or "Basic, Proficient, Advance": The more students with Met and Proficient/Advanced scores indicate the school is meeting state and federal education standards.

Look for how many students are at each achievement level. The more students scoring at a higher proficiency level the better.

When looking at School Accountability LOOK FOR:



Did the school meet the State **Annual Measurable Objectives**?

What percentage of students in the school met **proficient levels?** The higher the better.

How many students graduated compared to how many students were enrolled in the senior class?

Graduation rates help indicate how well schools work with at risk youth and keep students motivated.



ACCOUNTABILITY

- School Achievement Levels compared to the State Annual Measurable Objectives for Reading/Language Arts
- Percentage of students determined to be proficient
- Graduation rates
- Identity schools that require improvement, corrective action and/or restructuring
- Data on student performance on other academic indicators
- Annual Yearly Progress if applicable.

Military impacted schools may appear to have a higher non-graduation rate due to students who PCSed out in their senior year.

Is the school identified as one needing corrective action, improvement, or restructuring? You may also see words such



as: Priority, Focus, or Needing Intervention.

These schools have been identified as needing additional resources and assistance to bring up student achievement.


Demographics Break Outs can help you determine the diversity of the school and how the school works with different groups to ensure achievement.





Assistance With Withdrawals

When it comes to transitioning, withdrawing your child from school can sometimes become pushed to the back burner only to be dropped from the priority list. However, properly withdrawing your child from school can eliminate unnecessary stress in the end.

It is best to contact the school as soon as you find out you have been placed on assignment or will be moving to another location. The school's registrar will be able to guide you in fulfilling the requirements needed to correctly withdrawal your child. The same process is

followed for students who are enrolled in virtual school. Even though children are allowed to continue to engage in virtual learning while transitioning, the child's official school records will need to be moved to the gaining location.

In an effort to continue to ensure smooth transitioning for our families, we would like to stress the importance of making the connection with the school before leaving the installation. Voice of Democracy Rules and Eligibility

WHO CAN ENTER

The Voice of Democracy Program is open to students in grades 9-12 enrolled by the Oct. 31 deadline in public, private, parochial school, or home study program in the U.S., its territories or its possessions. Dependents of U.S. military or civilian personnel in overseas schools are also eligible to participate.

HOW TO ENTER

Download the Voice of Democracy entry form and brochure to submit your essay to your local VFW Post.

Students should record their reading of the draft to an audio CD or flash drive. The recording can be no shorter than three minutes and no longer than five minutes (plus or minus five seconds).

Entries begin at the Post level. Once the student creates their essay and completes burning the audio version to an audio CD/flash drive, they can submit their typed version, CD/flash drive and the Voice of Democracy entry form to their local participating VFW Post by the Oct. 31 deadline.

JUDGING CRITERIA

Originality is worth 30 points: Treatment of the theme should show imagination and human interest.

Content is worth 35 points: Clearly express your ideas in an organized manner. Fully develop your theme and use transitions to move smoothly from one idea to the other.

Delivery is worth 35 points: Speak in a clear and credible manner.

Patriot's Pen Rules and Eligibility

WHO CAN ENTER

The Patriot's Pen program is open to 6th-, 7th- and 8th-grade students enrolled by the Oct. 31 deadline in public, private, parochial school, or home study program in the U.S., its territories or its possessions. Dependents of U.S. military or civilian personnel in overseas schools are also eligible to participate.

HOW TO ENTER

Download and complete the Patriot's Pen entry form and brochure.

Essays must be no less than 300 words and cannot exceed 400 words. They should be submitted to the VFW Post, along with the completed Patriot's Pen entry form no later than the October 31 deadline.

Students can ask a teacher or youth group leader to supervise their progress in the competition.

JUDGING CRITERIA

Knowledge of the theme is worth 30 points. You must show a thorough knowledge of the theme in your work. Demonstrate you have researched the issue extensively.

Theme development is worth 35 points. Answer all relevant facts about the theme such as the who, what, where, when and why. Relate the theme to your own experiences.

Clarity of ideas is worth 35 points. Write your essay in an easy-tounderstand format. Leave your reader with a clear understanding of your explanation of the theme.

BGCA Keystone Club



- 16. Surprisingly, pumpkin pie isn't America's favorite.


